



HEALTHY FOOD FOR ALL COALITION MEETING NOTES

DECEMBER 16, 2014 | STOCKTON BLVD PARTNERSHIP

OVERVIEW

The Healthy Food for All Coalition met on Tuesday, December 18, 2014 at the Stockton Blvd Partnership. A full list of participants can be found at the end of this document. The goals and objectives for the meeting included:

- Participants are clear and connected to the collective Coalition work plan;
- Participants capitalize on the opportunity to collaborate using Open Space Technology;
- Participants glean and incorporate lessons learned and best practices from the evaluation report into their work moving forward; and
- Participants feel excited and energized about moving forward as part of the Coalition.

SEMI-FINAL WORK PLAN REVIEW

During the November meeting, the Coalition completed a semi-final draft work plan. While the draft work plan is still missing a handful of grantees' activity timelines, it provides a relatively accurate sense of where the Coalition's time, energy, and efforts will be focused over the next 12 months. Overall, participants shared that the timeline of activities provided a clearer sense of what Coalition partners would be working on, and, where opportunities for collaboration exist. Nevertheless, while the opportunities for collaboration were more apparent, participants noted that the onus to actually do the collaboration was clearly the next step. There was also an interest in more deeply exploring the details of a handful of the activities as well as discussing how the Coalition would ensure that some of the more general activities would be implemented. As a result, finalizing the work plan emerged as a strong priority for the Coalition. Finally, a concern was raised about the degree of community trust-building mechanisms in place both preceding and integrated into existing Coalition activities. For the activities to be successful, trust and buy-in from the community will be critical. To this end, it was noted that the food access activities are essentially designed to serve as initial mechanism for engagement and trust-building in the community due to their tangible nature and ability to meet an overarching existing need. Finally, the draft work plan only covers 2015 and so the Coalition will revisit the timeline activity in March/April to complete a quarterly timeline for 2016 as well.

OPEN SPACE TECHNOLOGY: AN OPPORTUNITY FOR COLLABORATION

During the September meeting, several Coalition partners shared their interest in utilizing Open Space Technology (OST) as a tool for collaboration and inter-Coalition communication. As a result, OST was integrated into December's meeting. Participants were provided with a general overview of the tool (including the elements and principles) and then given an opportunity to determine the topics they most wanted to talk about. Participants self-selected into one of the topics and rotated as desired. Please see below for highlights from each discussion topic.

PRESENTATION: YEAR 4 EVALUATION REPORT

Tiffany Wilson (LPC Consulting) presented participants with a document summarizing the Healthy Food for All Year 4 Evaluation Report. She led the group through a comparison of the report summary with the existing draft year 5 Coalition work plan. For the evaluation, Tiffany pointed out that LPC focused primarily on indicators and noted that indicators were largely informed by the activities. She also shared that LPC and Soil Born Farms are in the process of determining what the year 5 evaluation will look like. Once there is more clarity around the year 5 evaluation, that information will be shared with the Coalition. Ultimately, the goal is to work on both a Coalition work plan AND a Coalition evaluation report in order to capture a comprehensive snapshot of everyone's work. As part of the summary document, participants received a snapshot of the progress that was made in the last four years for each outcome and indicator; HFFA partners achieved all of the indicators for outcomes 1 and 4, and made partial progress on outcomes 2, 3, and 5. Tiffany noted that LPC had a really hard time connecting with residents to solicit their feedback for the evaluation report and as a result, LPC is currently refining their methods for connecting with residents for future reporting. She concluded by reviewing each of the final recommendations coming out of the report.

In response to the presentation, Shawn Harrison (Soil Born Farms) noted that the evaluation report is an opportunity to relay the Coalition's story and that in order to reach this goal, it needs to be a dynamic document that is revisited at the Coalition level on a regular basis. He also shared that there is still more work to do on the quantitative side in terms of collecting data (e.g. grantees filling out data forms, submitting logs). For Coalition partners who are not currently a BHC grantee, data on their work is not being collected meaning that the full story of the Coalition's collective work is not necessarily being told. Participants were encouraged to review the report in its entirety in order to maximize the opportunity to learn together and improve ways to tell the collective story.
